ALL RULES ARE SUBJECT TO CHANGE BY THE ASSOCIATION

Uniform Rules for 4-H Horse Shows will be in effect. The following are in addition to the Uniform Rules:

G-1 All members must follow all safety rules as outlined in project books.

G-1A In the event of lightning and/or thunder is seen or heard, classes will be suspended for a 20 minute period. This applies from the last lightning and/or thunder witnessed.

G-1B Condition of the show rings. the overall condition of the show rings shall be determined by a quorum of the Executive Committee/Committee Chair with consultation if required by other parties, (ie.Steward/Judge). The Show Judge shall have final decision over the condition of the show rings. The final decision on participation lies in the hands of the participant and his/her guardians.

G-2 At the discretion of the SC4-HSHA, a drug test may be requested on any animal. See the General Rules section of the most current Uniform Rules for 4-H Horse Shows. A positive result will at the expense of the exhibitor, while a negative result will be at the expense of the SC4-HSHA. Any medication given to a horse, such as but not limited to Ace, Bute (Butazolodin), Rompun, any kind of antibiotic or analgesic (pain killer) or performance enhancing medication, must be reported to the SC4-HSHA with a veterinarian's order prior to administration of the medication. Failure to comply or a positive test result will result in forfeiture of all winnings and disqualification from the show, including ribbons, trophies, and points.

G-3 It is the responsibility of the exhibitor, advisors and parents to read and understand all of the Uniform Rules, Performance Against Standards rules, and Association county rules. Acknowledgment form must be signed and returned to SC4-HSHA committee by June 1st.

G-4 Unsportsmanlike conduct as defined under Uniform Rules for 4H Horse Shows under general rules will not be tolerated by parent, advisor or any 4-H member and will be grounds for dismissal from the fairgrounds.

G-5 All 4-H members and other minors attending Association events at the fairgrounds must have adult supervision (parent/guardian or 4-H advisor).

G-6 Each exhibitor is responsible for wearing the correct entry number. Failure to do so will result in disqualification from the class. See the General Rules section of the most current Uniform Rules for 4-H Horse Shows.

G-7 Points will be kept on a horse/rider combination. In the event of a catastrophic event (death or long term disability) as verified by a large animal veterinarians written documentation. The Executive Committee has the power to review on an individual basis.

G-8 In accordance with the Uniform Rules for 4H Horse Shows "General Rules" It is required that youth wear protective head gear at all times while riding a horse. Protective head gear is acceptable in any 4-H class even if it is not the style that goes with a certain class. When buying protective head gear, the buyer should look for the letters ASTM and SEI which indicates that the head gear has met safety standards.

G-9 The project horse shown at the state fair must be the one the 4-H member qualified with in his or her county. Counties may send their youth to another county to qualify for any reason, in doing so the in county youth will pay a minimal fee and the out of county youth will pay a minimum fee of \$10.00

2010 RULES PERTAINING TO THE SUMMIT COUNTY FAIR

F-1 All 4-H Saddle Horse members attending the Summit County Fair will be bound by the General Rules and Regulations of the Summit County Agricultural Society (SCAS) and the regulations outlined under the Horse Division. Violations will be dealt with by the SC4-HSHA Executive Committee.

F-2 All 4-H members and other minors on the fairgrounds will honor a curfew between 11:00 p.m. (Or one hour after the end of the horse show) and 6:00 a.m.

F-3 Each 4-H participant or their representative must volunteer a minimum of four (4) hours before Fair. These hours may be earned at the following SC4-HSHA events: fairgrounds clean-up days, competitive trail ride, dressage show set-up, horse camp (up to 4 hours per day) and the State Qualifier (if their club is not already assigned). These hours may be earned at the same events including Open Show dates for which their club is not already assigned. Failure to meet the minimum volunteer requirements will result in disqualification from High Point eligibility and Versatility eligibility. You will be notified of disqualification at the July association meeting.

F-4 Project books for any Equine event must be carried at one time prior to year or year of Fair subject to 4H Rule. All project books should be listed on all 4H paperwork, (ie. Registration, Fair). Project book verification subject to 4H Extension office review. All participants are advised to review 4H requirements of participation yearly.

F-5 See the "Ownership" section of the most current Uniform Rules for 4-H Horse Shows, #3, #4, #5, #6, #7 as follows:

3. All animals carried as 4-H projects and those that are shown at the State Fair must be owned or leased and in the continual care of the 4-H member by the date specified by the member's county. This date shall be no later than June 1. Continual care does permit boarding an animal, provided the member is involved in caring for the horse.

4. Lessons, instruction, and advice for the member are encouraged. As long as the member is present in a learning situation, such assistance can include occasional riding or handling of the horse by another person, but cannot include regular training and care of the horse within 30 days of competition in any county State Fair qualifying show or the State Fair Junior Horse Show. Showing a 4-H member's project animal in a class at a show is not considered training. However, if a project animal is shown by someone other than the 4-H member in an open or breed show within the 30 days prior to the 4-H competition, the 4-H member must be present and must show the project horse in that show.

5. Family members can ride a 4-H member's project horse without the 4-H member being present within the 30-day limit as long as it is not a daily occurrence and is merely for pleasure (i.e. trail riding with visiting relatives or friends) and does not include training of the horse for the show ring.

6. Only people showing an animal in a class at a show can ride, drive, or train that animal at the show. The violator and the horse will be disqualified from further participation at that show. (An exception may be made for children simply wanting to sit on or to be led while riding the horse in a non-schooling manner.) From the time the equine arrives at the state show grounds for the State Fair Junior Horse Show, only the exhibitor will ride, drive, exercise, or train the horse.

7. In the event of injury or illness of the participant, as verified by the Executive Committee, the participant's immediate family or advisors only may attend to the care of the horse. Care is defined as walking or lunging the project animal in addition to feeding, watering and tending to stall maintenance.

F-6 A fee of \$100.00 per participant and \$75.00 for each sibling will be charged to attend the 4-H horse program at the Summit County Fair. Stall reservations and fees must be turned in by the club advisor only by June 1st. A late fee of \$25.00 will be assessed beginning June 10th to each 4-H-er who does not meet the June 1st deadline. The outstanding fees and late fee must be paid in full by cash or money order only by July 1st, or the 4-H-er is not eligible for Fair that year. Checks and money orders are to be made payable to the SC4-HSHA. No stall may be reserved or used for anything other than the project animal. Stall assignments will be made by the Fair Committee chairperson with the cooperation of the Fair Committee. Each 4-H-er participating at the fair with a horse project must sell the appropriate amount of ads for the Ad Book or pay the appropriate fee.

F-7 Proof of inoculations for Rhinopneumonitis, influenza, tetanus, eastern and western encephalomyelitis are required before the project animal is brought to the fair. This is to be turned in by June 1st and be dated between February 1st and June 1st of the current year. Failure to comply by the June 1st date will result in disqualification from the fair. Self administered vaccinations require paid proof of receipt. Additional shots recommended by the association veterinarian may be required at a later date. Any question of animal health will be determined by the Summit County Fair's equine veterinarian. The veterinarian's decision is final.

F-8 The following list of deadlines must be met:

Rotating Trophy Committee in good condition no later than the Sunday before Fair.

F-9 All horse projects must be stalled in the barns. All tack and equipment must be in designated tack stalls or horse trailers. No hay or feed may be stored in the barns. No hay bags or nets are allowed in stalls unless need is documented by a veterinarian's order.

F-10 All fans and temporary lights (those not wired directly into the building's wiring) used in stalls must be out of horses reach by hanging them outside the stalls or hanging them at least nine (9) feet off the ground. All temporary lights must be turned off by 11:00 p.m. or one hour after the last class.

F-11 All horses are to remain in designated areas. No horses are allowed in the camping area, park, or pavilion areas. No horses are allowed past the bathroom or on the driveway.

F-12 All horse project members are required to clean their stalls or all bedding, etc., before taking

horses off the fairgrounds. No release slips will be issued before stalls are inspected and approved.

F-13 All 4-H members and adults must wear boots whenever they are handling a horse. Long pants and boots must be worn whenever mounted. Heels down riding shoes may be substituted for boots. Absolutely no sandals in the barns or when handling horses. No tube tops, spaghetti strap tops, and midriffs must be covered. All apparel must be appropriately worn in style and modesty. Advisors are to monitor own clubs. No bareback riding at any time.

F-14 In case of illness or other emergency, projects affected must obtain release from the SC4-HSHA president. This release is only obtainable from the SC4-HSHA president. The president will obtain approval from the Fair Board and notify the Extension Office. SC4-HSHA reserves the right to obtain verification of the excuse. The party leaving is still responsible for cleaning and stripping the stall. Failure to obtain this release will result in ineligibility to show at Fair and State Qualifier the following year and will forfeit all awards, trophies, and ribbons awarded during the week of Fair.

F-15 For removal of a project for competition at the State Fair, the project must receive written approval by the SC4-HSHA president prior to release. The project may be removed during the hours of 11:00 p.m. and 9:00 a.m. any day during Fair. Any project leaving the fair must have a stall release slip prior to leaving. The project can return to Fair with the pre-approval of the SC4-HSHA president. The project must return between the hours of 11:00 p.m. and 9:00 a.m. Failure to obtain the required paperwork will result in ineligibility to show at Fair and the State Qualifier the following year and will forfeit all awards, trophies, and ribbons awarded during the week of Fair.

F-16 Trailers can only enter and leave at Gate B. Horses must be loaded in the loading area north of Barn 10. Any trailer parked adjacent to Barn 6 must be moved to Barn 10 prior to loading the horse via the dirt road east of the main ring. No vehicles are allowed in the Midway. Horses returning must follow the same procedure. Failure to follow this procedure will result in ineligibility to show at Fair and the State Qualifier the following year and will forfeit all awards, trophies, and ribbons awarded during the week of Fair.

F-17 Leaving Fair at Fair completion: No project can leave Fair before 8:00 p.m. the last day of Fair unless excused as in Rules F-14 and F-15. The project must have a signed stall release from the barn superintendent prior to leaving. Stall decorations can only be removed during the hours of 7:00 a.m. and 9:00 a.m. the last day of Fair or after 8:00 p.m. the last day of Fair, and must be removed by the entire club completely, including all staples, etc. Any stall decorations not removed during this time must stay up all day. Failure to follow this procedure will result in ineligibility to show at Fair and the State Qualifier the following year and will forfeit all awards, trophies, and ribbons awarded during the week of Fair.

F-18 Eight (8) ribbons will be awarded in each class. Points will be awarded in the point classes on the basis of eight (8) points for first place, seven (7) points for second place, etc., as long as there are at least eight (8) entrants in the class. For class sizes smaller than eight (8), the points awarded to first place will equal the number of entries, second place will be awarded one (1) point less than the number of entries, etc. Any classes that have splits will receive the number of points awarded in the largest split. In the calculation of all awards, the total number of points earned will be divided by the total number of points possible for that award multiplied by 100 to obtain the score. In the event of error a duplicate award will be presented but appropriate points will be awarded based on corrected results.

F-19 Versatility Class (see Uniform Rules)

- 1) Riders eligible for participation in versatility include the Advanced Division riders having earned the highest percentage points in the versatility point classes as listed in F-18 plus the Grand and Reserve highpoint Intermediate Division riders only. If the Grand or Reserve Intermediate Division highpoint champions decline, there will be no more invitations extended to either Advanced or Intermediate riders.

- 2) The exhibitor must have placed in a showmanship or horsemanship/equitation class at the fair. The exhibitor must have a minimum of four (4) points to be eligible for versatility.
- 3) There will be a minimum of fifteen (15) and maximum of twenty-four (24) exhibitors. This will be a combination of Advanced and the Grand and Reserve highpoint Champions from the Intermediate division. The Advanced participants will be determined by the highest percentage points in the possible classes listed below. (defined in F-19 section 4) The ratio of riders included per seat will be based on the number of entries in each seat.
- 4) The following classes may be used to qualify for versatility to be determined by the Fair Committee and approved by the association:

Other Structured and/or State Approved classes may be added per division as suggested by the Fair Committee and APPROVED BY THE ORGANIZATION. 1st year classes that are added will not be included in High Point of Versatility computations.

- 5) Upon failure to sign within two hours will result in forfeiture of eligibility.
- 6) Selected participants or parent with proper identification and back number must sign to confirm their participation within 2 hours after eligibility is posted. Alternate participants will only be selected until 2 hours after acceptance by selected participants (4 hours after original posting). At 12 midnight time limits for signups will stop and resume at 7 a.m. Additionally, no invitations will be extended after 10 a.m. Those being extended an invitation up to 10 a.m. still have the full 2 hours to accept or decline. If any advanced member declines to participate, a replacement will be selected in the following order:
 - a) The participant in any seat that tied but was eliminated because of lower percentage points;
 - b) The next highest percentage point exhibitor in the same seat as the declining participant;
 - c) If there is no other eligible exhibitor in the same seat as the declining participant, the next participant selected will be based on the highest percentage points earned without regard to seat.
- 7) Each rider is allowed two (2) grooms. All changes of tack and appointments must be made in the designated area. No rider or groom is allowed to leave the designated area during the tack change. No one is allowed to accept anything over the fence. No change of tack or exchanges of any kind is allowed between participants. All changes of tack and appointments must be made within the 10-minute interval between events or the entry will be eliminated (see Uniform Rules for 4-H Horse Shows, Versatility Class, #6) from the entire versatility class. No groom is allowed to enter the designated area after the 10-minute interval.
- 8) All versatility participants and grooms must attend a meeting prior to the class. This will be scheduled for a specific time on the day of the class. All versatility participants and grooms will be required to sign an acknowledgment of the versatility rules. Failure of the entrant or the grooms to attend the meeting and sign the rules acknowledgment results in loss of eligibility from the versatility class.
- 9) Appropriate dress is required of the grooms (long pants, boots, long sleeve shirts or club shirts) or the entrant will be disqualified from the entire versatility class.

- 10) The versatility rider will be dressed for each class as specified in the Uniform Rules for 4-H Horse Shows. One exception: Riders may wear English riding pants under western chaps but western boots must be worn.
- 11) All grooms and wheelbarrows must remain in the make-up area.
- 12) Ten (10) places will be awarded. The exhibitor must compete in all classes to be eligible for awards.
- 13) A supervised water table will be provided for all participants in the versatility class. No other refreshments of any kind will be allowed. Any violation of this rule will result in immediate dismissal from the entire versatility class. One exception: Doctor-documented medical condition.

F-20 Stall Decoration and Clean Stall awards will be given. Stall decorations are optional, but if a club chooses to participate in stall decorating, then the entire club must participate and all club stalls must be decorated. Stall decoration guidelines are as follows:

- 1) Association theme must be used and displayed.
- 2) Decorations must be made by 4-H members.
- 3) No nails or tape may be used.
- 4) Banners must be at least nine (9) feet above the ground.
- 5) All stalls assigned to a participating club must be decorated. All stall decorations must be removed in accordance with Rule# F-17.
- 6) Stall decorations are to be judged by a committee of three (3) non-association people.
- 7) The 4-H motto and pledge must be displayed.
- 8) Stall decorations must be completed during the time specified by the fair chairperson. The clubs advisors are responsible for all stall decorations to be completed by the deadline.
- 9) All guidelines must be followed in order to be eligible for awards.

F-21 All horses stalled on 4-H grounds must have emergency information adhered to the front of the stall in a clear manner. This information shall consist of a contact person's name (must be at least 18 years of age), club name, advisors names, and camping lot number or emergency phone number. The club advisor will provide a roster of 4-H-ers and their horses to the fair chairperson. Copies of the rosters will be kept in the Saddle Horse office, the Fair Board office, and with the barn superintendents.

F-22 Explanation of Fair divisions:

Once an exhibitor has shown in a particular division, she/he may not regress to a lower division.

Walk/Trot -

- 1) Not allowed to show in any canter classes at the Summit County Fair.
- 2) May elect to show in Walk/Trot for a maximum of two (2) years.
- 3) No age limit.
- 4) Walk/Trot riders are not eligible for Versatility Class or to be State Fair representatives except for Competitive Trail

Novice -

- 1) May elect to show in Novice for a maximum of three (3) years.
- 2) Novice riders are not eligible for Versatility Class or to be State Fair representatives except for Dressage and Competitive Trail.

Intermediate -

- 1) Intermediate riders are eligible to be a State Fair representative.
- 2) Entrants are ineligible for Intermediate if they previously qualified to be a Senior State Fair representative. (14-18 years of age)
- 3) Entrants are eligible for Intermediate if they previously qualified to be a Junior State Fair representative. (Age 13 or under)
- 4) Only Grand and Reserve Champion Intermediate riders are eligible for Versatility Class.

Advanced -

1) Advanced riders are eligible for Versatility Class and to be State Fair representatives.

F-22A Split for Walk Trot & Novice

- 1) Split classes at 17 participants
- 2) Splits done by age based on average age

F-22B Number of Participants required to determine a Division

It is recommended that a minimum number of four (4) participants be required for a division. This applies to both Horse and Pony divisions. Final decision on division size will be determined by vote of the SC4HSHA.

F-23 Explanation of Divisions and High Point Awards:

Members may ride only classes in their declared seat and division. Points will be accumulated in their declared seat. Fair high point awards will be given in the following divisions and based on the most percentage points in each division/seat accumulated during the fair.

Awards:

- 1st Champion Award
- 2nd Reserve Champion Award
- 3rd-8th Awards

Walk/Trot, Novice, and Intermediate division high point champions and reserve champions (1st and 2nd place) must move up regardless of seat or project. In case of a tie, the rider with the highest placing's will be first. A first year Walk/Trot champion or reserve champion may elect to show Walk/Trot a second year, but will be required to forfeit High Point for their second year.

F-24 If any person other than the 4-H member is riding their project animal at the Summit County Fair, the 4-H member and all other 4-H members involved will forfeit all points for versatility and high point awards and will be ineligible to show the remainder of the fair, with the exception of parent/advisors during designated times. In accordance with the Uniform Rules for 4-H Horse Shows (Ownership, #1), a horse can be leased to only one 4-H member / family as a project. If the lessor agrees, siblings can also lease the horse as a 4-H project as long as the rules for others riding a 4-H member's horse are followed.

F-25 Any parent/advisor witnessing any type of misconduct may report such misconduct to an executive committee member. Misconduct or violation of any rule will be dealt with by the Associations Executive Committee and may result in dismissal from the fairgrounds. The person reporting the

misconduct must have some form of proof to present with the report. It must be promptly reported to an Association Executive Committee member. Misconduct must be reported by the person witnessing it. The report must include the rule which was violated, the members name who violated the rule, the project horse's name, and, if anyone else was involved (i.e. trainer, other 4-H-er, etc.), that person's name. This information will be kept confidential. Upon receipt of this information, an Executive Committee meeting will be called to determine the plan of action. The Executive Committee will investigate the allegation. Upon completion of the investigation, the 4-H-er in question, his/her parent/guardian and the 4-H club advisor will meet with the Executive Committee, a representative of the 4-H office, a representative of the Fair Board, and the person making the allegation, to hear the final decision and sanctions, if deemed necessary by the Executive Committee. If the 4-H-er's parent/guardian are not satisfied with the decision, they may file a protest following the Uniform Rules of 4-H Shows and association By-Laws (see Article XV).

F-26 Games Classes (Gymkhana):

- 1) Officials for gymkhana classes will include one association member and one adult from the club whose duty it is to oversee the ring operation.
- 2) Each rider may only ride in the division listed on his/her Fair registration.
- 3) The division for Gymkhana at Fair will be Walk/Trot, Novice, Intermediate, and Advanced.
- 4) In case of an odd number of entries, a rider from the same division may ride in the class a second time to compete a team but the points won will only go to the first-time entrant.
- 5) Riders must wear a club shirt of conservative style or a long-sleeved western-style shirt, breeches or jeans, and riding boots.
- 6) Shirts must be tucked in and, if a long-sleeved shirt is worn, the long sleeves must be rolled down and fastened at the wrists. All apparel must be appropriately worn in style and modesty.
- 7) Walk/Trot games riders must only walk or trot. Any canter stride will receive no time.
- 8) In all games classes, no time will be given to an entry who stops forward motion at any time after the timer is activated. Stopping of forward motion includes pausing, spinning, backing, turning circles outside the pattern, etc.

F-27 State Representatives:

- 1) All State Fair Representatives/State Fair qualifiers will receive an award. This includes PAS, Competitive Trail, Groom & Clean, Dressage
 - 1a) Awards will only be issued to 1st place in the Jr./Sr. Divisions for Groom & Clean and Competitive Trail.
- 2) All State Fair representatives must attend the state level competitions in order to receive a State Fair representative award.
- 3) Awards will be awarded to any individual qualifier and/or representative only every other year.
